Wordplay and Puns

- What is a fish with no eyes? (Fsh)
- What do you call a boomerang that doesn't come back? (A stick)
- What did the ocean say to the beach? (Nothing, it just waved)

- Enhanced Problem-Solving Skills: Riddles encourage children to break down a problem and devise strategies to solve it.




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
